What has been your most meaningful volunteer experience?



What do you hope to accomplish this school year?


I hope to continue to be involved in lots of extracurricular activities! Whether through intramural sports, clubs, or other opportunities, I hope to continue these rewarding experiences.

What or who inspired you to choose your major?
